## 7,000 fans vie to be in new Stone movie

## Texas Stadium made up for film's fictitious teams

IRVING — Football fans at Texas Stadium on Saturday were covered in body paint, wore oversized Cowboy hats and sported team colors.

But the Dallas Cowboys' silver and blue were conspicuously absent and replaced by yellow and red.

More than 7,000 fans turned out for a chance to be in Oliver Stone's upcoming football movie, Any Given Sunday. Mr. Stone has filmed other movies in Dallas including scenes for Born on the Fourth of July and JFK.

The new film is a behind-thescenes look at professional football, featuring the fictitious teams the Dallas Knights and Miami Sharks. The film stars Al Pacino, Cameron Diaz, Dennis Quaid, Ann-Margret and James Woods.

"I'm a big Oliver Stone fan," said Jeremy Medcalf of Arlington, wearing a large red Cowboy hat with "Knights" printed on the side. "I'd love to be in it. Just to point [at a movie screen] and say, "There I am.'"

Not only did some Dallas Cowboy fans get a make-over Saturday, so did the stadium. The silver-andblue interior was painted over with red and yellow, including portions of the field.

"We are getting great shots," said Tina Kerr, crowd promotions and extra casting director.

Ms. Kerr said the fans were seated with cardboard cutouts of people and then asked to cheer, boo and do "the wave" on command. And, to keep people entertained during breaks, prizes were raffled.

Fans also were given programs with a crash course in movie lingo — standby, action, rolling and cut.

Christina Schreiber, 18, and other friends drove from Tulsa, Okla., for a little star-gazing and a chance to be a movie extra.

"I want to see Cameron Diaz!" Christina said, wearing a red dress, yellow Tweety Bird slippers and glittering gold makeup.

Decked out in Dallas Knights team colors, Jana Arnold said her husband was in full body paint doing the "belly hip" with friends. The more outrageous, she said, the better chances of getting on film.
